OVERVIEW

History is a process that consists of two main functions: fact gathering and fact interpretation. You will have the opportunity in this assignment to carry out the same skills and functions that the professional historian undertakes. In this essay, process (i.e. the stages or steps in the research), as well as the product (i.e. the final essay) will be assessed as indicated below.

Students will type a research paper for this class. The paper will be no less than 7 pages and no more than 10 pages.

The first three stages will be worth 100 points each and 100 points for the final paper, all of which will count as test grades.

STAGES

1. PROPOSAL

- This should be a 1 page typed submission stating the following:
 - o The background of your chosen topic,
 - o A tentative hypothesis with
 - 2-3 arguments or premises that you'll be using to support your hypothesis,
 - Your thesis cannot rehash what is already known. It must be something new and original.
 - o Method by which you will support your thesis. Examples could include
 - A list of resources you've been able to locate so far.
 - A discussion about where you will locate more resources.

2. OUTLINE

- Your outline should include a **finalized** thesis with supporting arguments.
- A complete bibliography of sources you have researched
- Raw data from your research, and should clearly show your sources, page references, information, and some semblance of organization must be turned in.
- Due February 21th

3. ROUGH DRAFT

- This is a completed essay in rough form. It should be double-spaced for easier editing, reading, and self-correction.
- Due April 15th

4. FINAL ESSAY – Due May 27st

- This must the completed and final essay with proper in-text citations in MLA format and a Works Cited.
- Formatting guidelines
 - o 1 inch margins, 12 points
 - o Times New Roman, double spaced
- All notes will be turned in with your paper

RESEARCH STEPS

- 1. Brainstorm ideas that you might be interested in.
- 2. Start by reading related sections in your class text. (Use the index!)
- 3. Prepare for the LMC research. Have a plan.
- 4. Consult more specialized sources (monographs) pertaining to your topic using history department books, school & public libraries. University libraries are even better.

SUGGESTED ESSAY TOPICS

When selecting a topic, first consider broad themes such as the major ones in this course. For example:

- Science? Perhaps considering some aspect of the work of Galileo, Newton, Kepler, Darwin, Einstein, or an essay analyzing the impact of the Scientific Revolution or Age of Enlightenment.
- Art? Perhaps the contributions of: classicism, romanticism, impressionism, expressionism, modern art.
- Warfare? The Napoleonic wars, Franco-Prussian War, World Wars I&II.
- Revolution? The "classic" revolutions French, Russian.
- Great Leaders Louis XIV, Napoleon, Bismarck, Mazzini, Mussolini, Lenin, Churchill, Stalin, Hitler.
- Social/Political Movements? Liberalism, socialism, communism, utilitarianism, Marxism, fascism, industrialism
- Philosophy/Philosophy of History? Schools of philosophic thought 1600's to the present and/or specific philosophers and their contributions; the nature of History as an intellectual discipline.

Once you've selected one of the broad themes, you'll have to narrow it down to a specific topic. Keep in mind that your essay should not merely describe issues or personalities, but rather offer an analysis and point of view.

ESSAY DOCUMENTATION

"In writing your research paper, you must document everything that you borrow - not only direct quotations and paraphrases, but also information and ideas. Of course, common sense as well as ethics should determine what you document. For example, you rarely need to give sources for familiar proverbs ("You can't judge a book by its cover"), well-known quotations ("We shall overcome"), or common knowledge ("George Washington was the first president of the United States"). But you must indicate the source of any appropriated material that readers might otherwise mistake for your own." - MLA Handbook

Level A Strong thesis; a lot of effective analysis; substantial info; well organized/ written

Task: Thoroughly addresses all aspects of the task in depth

Analysis: Is more analytical than descriptive (compared and/ or contrasted issues and events) **Information:** Essay & argument richly supported with relevant facts, examples, and details

Writing style: Consistently well-developed, organized, logical essay

Intro & conclusion: Theme or task supported w/ strong introduction & conclusion

<u>Level B</u> Good thesis; some analysis; a lot of info; acceptable organization/writing

Task: All aspects of the task addressed with a good understanding of the theme

Analysis: Is both descriptive and analytical (compared and/ or contrasted issues and events)

Information: Essay & argument supported w/ a lot of info, listing of facts; task unevenly addressed

Writing Style: Well developed, organized, & logical essay

Intro & Conclusion: Supported w/ good introduction & conclusion

<u>Level C</u> Satisfactory thesis; simple analysis; some info; acceptable organization/ writing

Task: Develops all aspects of the task with little depth or most aspects in some depth **Analysis:** Is more descriptive than analytical (compared and/ or contrasted issues and events)

Information: Essay & argument supported with some information

Writing Style: Essay has some body structure with a general plan of organization

Intro & Conclusion: Simple introduction & conclusion

Level D No thesis; misunderstood question; little info, bad organization/writing

Task: Vague attempts to address all the task or some aspects of the task with some depth

Analysis: Is primarily descriptive; may include faulty, weak or isolated analysis

Information: Little and/or inaccurate information **Writing Style:** Poorly developed, unorganized

Intro & Conclusion: Missing or off-target introduction & conclusion

Level F No thesis; misunderstood question; no info; bad organization/ writing

Task: Attempts the task; limited understanding of the theme

Analysis: No analysis or evaluation; vague

Information: Weak, inaccurate, and/ or lacks outside information

Writing Style: Poorly developed; little or no organization
